

The Power Patio Awning (hereinafter referred to as awning) is intended to provide shade when installed on a Recreational Vehicle (RV). This awning is only suitable for the intended purpose and application in accordance with these instructions.

This manual provides information that is necessary for the proper installation of the awning. Poor installation and/or improper operating or maintenance will result in unsatisfactory performance and a possible failure. The manufacturer accepts no liability for any injury or damage to the product resulting from:

- Incorrect assembly or connection, including excess voltage
- Incorrect maintenance or use of spare parts other than original spare parts provided by the manufacturer
- Alterations to the product without express permission from the manufacturer
- Use for purposes other than those described in this manual

Dometic reserves the right to change product appearance and product specifications.

3 General Information

This section describes the tools and materials needed to install the awning and its components.

The images used in this document are for reference purposes only. Components and component locations may vary according to specific product models. Measurements may vary ±0.38 in. (10 mm).



4 Specifications

This section provides the specifications for the back channel hardware dimensions and the clearance between the awning and the RV door.

4.1 Back Channel Hardware Dimensions

The wiring harness location may be at the top or bottom depending on the awning model.





4.2 Door Clearance

Consider the location of doors, windows, lights, trim, slideouts, etc. when determining the length and position of the awning so as not to obstruct the operation or block any of these components.



2 Determining Minimum Distance

- (1) Minimum Distance Between the Awning Rail and the Entry Door
- When the entry door is towards the center of the awning, add 2 in. (51 mm) to the minimum distance.

5 Preinstallation


NOTICE: Do **not** allow the corner of the entry door to contact the awning fabric. Otherwise, premature wear or tearing of the awning fabric could occur. If there is the potential for a squared corner entry door to contact the awning fabric, a door roller kit **must** be installed. See "Optional Parts and Kits" on page 4.



Rounded corner doors may not require a door roller kit if there is no potential for damage to the awning fabric.

This section provides information on preparing the awning hardware prior to awning installation.


5.1 Installing the Door Roller and **Edge Guard (Optional)**



3 Positioning the Door Roller

(1) Position Above Door (3) Outer Entry Door (2) Door Roller

- 1. Position the door roller on the upper corner of the outer entry door, opposite the hinge, and 0.3-0.4 in. (8-10 mm) above the door edge.
- 2. Drill two pilot holes.
- 3. Insert and tighten the mounting screws.



4 Clipping the Door Edge Guard


(1) Door Edge Guard

4. Clip the door edge guard onto the upper corner of the inner screen door, opposite the hinge.

5.2 Preparing the Awning Rail

NOTICE: Make sure the awning rail is parallel to the RV floor, and is **not** warped or curved before installing the awning fabric. If the awning rail is not straight, the awning fabric may wrinkle or stretch.

- 1. Select the desired awning rail end (on the RV) into which awning fabric will be inserted.
- 2. Flare (widen) that end of rail with a flat-bladed screwdriver.




If the awning is equipped with LED lights, only flare the top of awning rail opening.

3. Use a metal file to remove any sharp edges.


5.2.1 Preparing the Awning Hardware

WARNING: IMPACT, PINCH, AND/OR CRUSH HAZARD. Failure to obey the following warnings could result in death or serious injury:

- Do **not** remove the ties wrapped around each arm assembly until the top casting is secured to the front channel, the awning fabric is attached to the awning rail, and the arm assembly is mounted to the RV. Arm assemblies are under tension from the gas strut. Removing these ties could allow the arms to extend guickly and unexpectedly.
- Do **not** set the top casting behind the tongue. The awning roller assembly is not properly restrained and could become separated.
- Do **not** remove the cotter pin from the torsion rod (at the end cap) until both of the top castings are secured to the corresponding front channels. Otherwise, rapid casting spin off will occur. Spring tension will attempt to spin the hardware and/or fabric roller tube guickly and unexpectedly.
- The right hand arm assembly (front channel) is pre-wired for the awning motor.
- 1. Carefully lay the fabric roller tube assembly (FRTA) on a clean, well padded V-shaped trough (or other well protected surface) to prevent fabric damage.




- 6 Positioning the Top Casting

- 2. Position the right-hand top casting in the main arm and slide the groove over the tongue.
 - The groove in the top casting **must** slide over the tongue in the main arm.




8 Securing the Right-Hand Front Channel

- 3. Secure the right-hand top front channel to the righthand top casting with the screw and washer.
- 4. Position the left-hand top casting in the main arm and slide the groove over the tongue. See Figure 6.

The groove in the top casting **must** slide over the tongue in the main arm.

- 5. Secure the left-hand top front channel to the lefthand top casting with the screw and washer.
- 6. Straighten the bent end of cotter pin.
- 7. Rotate the fabric roller tube (as if unrolling the awning) by pulling bottom of the FRTA toward you.
 - This will reduce pressure on cotter pin for easier removal.
- 8. While holding the FRTA, pull the cotter pin out and discard.
 - Removing the cotter pin will release the factory preset torsion (spring) tension.

5.3 Determining the Awning Location

WARNING: IMPACT AND/OR CRUSH HAZARD.

Verify that the mounting surface on the RV is flat, that it has solid structural backing where the fasteners penetrate the surface, and that it will safely and securely support the awning. Otherwise, the awning may become unstable and could detach, bend, or collapse. Failure to obey this warning could result in death or serious injury. Consider the following when selecting the mounting awning mounting location:

- Select a solid structure in the RV wall for the support of the top mounting brackets and back channels.
- Allow enough clearance between the entry door and fabric, or slideout and fabric, to allow for awning pitch (slope). See "Door Clearance" on page 5.
- Avoid locations that would interfere with the entry door swing when the awning is completely extended.
- Make sure the arm assemblies do not restrict the use of doors, windows, slideouts, etc.
- If installing the awning over windows, use a back channel spacer kit. See "Optional Parts and Kits" on page 4.

6 Installation

- WARNING: ELECTRICAL SHOCK, FIRE, AND/ OR EXPLOSION HAZARD. Failure to obey the following warnings could result in death or serious injury:
- Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery before drilling or cutting into the RV.
- Make sure there are no obstacles such as wires or pipes inside the RV's walls.
- Do not pinch the wiring or allow the wiring to rub against sharp edges. If the wiring is damaged, it **must** be replaced by a qualified service technician.

NOTICE: Always seal the wiring against weather and moisture where the wiring enters the RV walls, roof, or floor. Otherwise, water leakage could occur.

This section describes how to install the electrical switches awning.

6.1 Installing the Electrical Kits

This section provides important supplemental information for installing electrical kits. For complete information, refer to the installation instructions included with the kits.

6.1.1 Installing a Wired Awning Switch

- Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.
- 2. Choose an installation location for the awning switch where it will not be exposed to weather, extreme temperatures, or long hours in direct sunlight.
- Install a 15 A fuse at the fuse panel for the positive (+) 12 VDC power supply (RED wire) to the switch.
- 4. Route the wiring inside the RV to the general location where the connections to the awning hardware will be made. Allow enough wiring length to pass through the outside RV wall. See "Back Channel Hardware Dimensions" on page 4.
- 5. Follow the instructions included with the awning switch kit to complete the installation.

6.1.2 Installing an Ignition/Safety Interlock System

WARNING: IMPACT AND/OR CRUSH HAZARD.

Do **not** install the awning in a motor home without also installing an ignition/safety interlock system. Otherwise, accidental operation during transit could occur. Failure to obey this warning could result in death or serious injury.

- The ignition interlock **must** break the circuit (cut power) to the awning when the ignition is on.
- Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.
- Install a 5A fuse at the fuse panel for the positive (+) 12 VDC ignition control (PINK wire) to the ignition interlock.
- 3. Follow the instructions included with the ignition/ safety interlock kit to complete the installation.

6.1.3 Installing a LED Light Switch

A LED light switch is only required for awning models equipped with a LED light strip.

 Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.

- 2. Choose an installation location for the LED light switch where it will not be exposed to weather, extreme temperatures, or long hours in direct sunlight.
- 3. Perform one of the following fuse installations.
 - Install a 5A fuse at the fuse panel for the positive (+) 12 VDC power supply (RED wire) to the LED light switch.
 - Install a 5A in-line fuse between the positive (+)
 12 VDC power supply (RED wire) and the LED light switch.
- 4. Route the wiring inside the RV to the general location where the connections to the awning hardware will be made. Allow enough wiring length to pass through the outside RV wall. See "Back Channel Hardware Dimensions" on page 4.
- 5. Follow the instructions included with the LED light switch kit to complete the installation.

6.2 Installing the Awning

WARNING: IMPACT AND/OR CRUSH HAZARD.

This awning should be installed in a controlled environment (inside). Do **not** install the awning during windy conditions, or when wind is expected. Otherwise, the awning could move unpredictably, become unstable, and could detach, bend, or collapse. Failure to obey this warning could result in death or serious injury.

NOTICE: Always use sealant on clean parts and surfaces where fasteners enter the RV walls, roof, and floor. Otherwise, leakage could occur.

Install the back channels on a flat surface, level, and keep parallel with each other to ensure correct function and appearance.

6.2.1 Inserting the Awning Fabric into the Awning Rail

WARNING: IMPACT AND/OR CRUSH HAZARD.


Do **not** remove the LED rail from the awning fabric (if equipped). Otherwise, the awning fabric could separate from the awning rail on the RV and cause the awning to extend quickly or detach, bend, or collapse. Failure to obey this warning could result in death or serious injury.

A CAUTION: LIFTING HAZARD.

Use proper lifting technique and control when lifting the awning. Failure to obey this caution could result in injury.

NOTICE: Keep both arm assemblies parallel to each other to avoid twisting.

- If the LED light strip is not desired, the standard awning fabric **must** be used. Otherwise, you may remove the LED light strip from the LED rail, and leave the empty LED rail on the fabric rope.
- 1. Unfurl the awning fabric one revolution.
 - Do **not** unfurl more than one revolution of fabric, as this could cause issues with awning closing and opening correctly. Unfurling one revolution will allow enough space between the RV wall and the awning hardware to guide the awning fabric into the awning rail.
- 2. Insert the awning fabric (with the awning roller cover, if equipped) into the awning rail.
 - A stepladder may be necessary to reach the awning rail.

(1) Arm Assembly (3) FRTA


 With one person grasping each arm assembly, carefully lift the entire awning assembly upright, then carry the awning to the prepared (flared) awning rail end.

- At least two other people are required to hold and control the awning hardware until the top mounting brackets and back channels are correctly installed.
- 4. While one person guides the awning fabric (with the awning roller cover, if equipped) into the awning rail, carefully move (carry) the awning hardware assembly to the desired location.

6.2.2 Attaching the Top Mounting Brackets/Arm Assemblies

WARNING: IMPACT AND/OR PINCH HAZARD. Arm assemblies are under tension from the gas strut. Hold the arm assemblies and the FRTA securely before removing ties. Otherwise, the arms will extend quickly and unexpectedly. Failure to obey this warning could result in death or serious injury.

NOTICE: Control the arm assemblies while installing the brackets. When the weight of the FRTA is not supported, downward force could cause the arm assemblies to swing sideways and damage the RV.



11 Attaching the Arm Assemblies


- (1) Arm Assembly

The motorized arm assembly is always installed at the right-hand side of awning.

1. When the awning is at the installation location, position the top mounting brackets (with the arm assemblies attached) directly under and parallel to the awning rail.

- Some awning rails have a wide drip channel to catch water as it runs off the RV roof. If the awning rail is too wide, it may be necessary to lower the position of the top mounting brackets to avoid interference with the FRTA.
- 2. While holding the arm assemblies securely in place, mark the top mounting bracket hole locations.
- 3. Determine the location of the wiring harness hole on your model. See "Back Channel Hardware Dimensions" on page 4.
 - The back channel will either have a notch at the top, or a hole near the bottom for wiring to pass through the RV wall.
 - If the wiring will pass through the RV wall at top of the back channel, mark the wiring hole (notch) location.
 - If the wiring will pass through the RV wall at the bottom of the back channel, go to the next step.
- 4. Carefully move the arm assemblies out of the way to expose the marked mounting hole locations.
- 5. Drill 3/16 in. diameter holes through the marked mounting hole locations and into the solid structure of the RV.
 - Drill 7/32 in. diameter holes if drilling into steel.
- 6. If the wiring will pass through the RV wall at the bottom of the right-hand back channel, drill a 5/8 in. diameter hole at the marked top wiring hole location and through the outside wall of RV.




- **12** Securing the Outer Arm Assembly Mounts

- 7. With the arm assembly completely closed, place the top mounting brackets against the wall and align the mounting holes to the pre-drilled holes in the RV.
- 8. Apply sealant to the screw threads.
- Secure the screw sthrough the outside (top) mounting holes and into the solid structure of RV.
 - Make sure the arm assemblies are completely closed before tightening the outside screws. Closed arm assemblies will help in the overall alignment of the awning.
- 10. While holding the arm assembly (front channel) and FRTA securely, carefully remove the nylon ties (and tape if applicable) around the front and back channels.
- 11. Allow the front channel to open slowly until the awning fabric is taut.
 - Slack from the unfurled fabric will allow the awning to open approximately 12–18 in. (305–457 mm).





- The motorized arm assembly is always installed at the right-hand side of awning.
- 1. Remove the wiring cover from the right-hand back channel (if applicable). Save it for later re-installation.
- 2. Square the back channels to the RV and the FRTA.
- 3. Mark the left- and right-hand bottom mounting hole locations. See "4.1 Back Channel Hardware Dimensions" on page 4.

Measuring from a door or window frame is acceptable.

- 4. Determine the location of the wiring harness hole on your model. See "Back Channel Hardware Dimensions" on page 4.
 - The back channel will either have a notch at the top, or a hole near the bottom for wiring to pass through the RV wall.
 - If the wiring will pass through the RV wall at bottom of the back channel, mark the wiring hole (notch) location.
 - If the wiring will pass through the RV wall at the top of the back channel, go to the next step.



- 5. Carefully swing the right-hand arm assembly out of the way to expose the marked hole locations.
 - If the arm is too stiff to swing aside, loosen the screw on the inside hole of the top mounting bracket.
- 6. Drill 3/16 in. diameter holes through the marked mounting hole locations and into the solid structure of the RV.



- Drill 7/32 in. diameter holes if drilling into steel.
- If the wiring will pass through the RV wall at the bottom of the right-hand back channel, drill a 5/8 in. diameter hole at the marked bottom wiring hole location and through the outside wall of RV.

Skip this step if attaching the left-hand back channel.


- 8. Swing the arm assembly back in place, and align its mounting holes to the pre-drilled holes in the RV.
- 9. Re-tighten the screw in the inside hole of the top mounting bracket if it was loosened earlier to swing the arm assembly aside.

- 10. Apply sealant to two Oscar rivets (installer supplied).
- 11. Insert the Oscar rivets through the bottom two mounting holes of the back channel and secure to the solid structure of the RV.
 - The structural backing (with skin) **must** be 0.4–0.5 in. [10–13 mm] thick to accommodate the Oscar rivets. Alternatively, structural screws may be used to secure the back channel if the RV has structural backing that will support at least 100 lbf/in² [689 kPa] per screw.
- 12. Repeat steps 5–11 on the left-hand arm assembly.

- 14. Insert and tighten the screws through the remaining holes of both top mounting brackets and into the solid structure of the RV.


6.4 Wiring the Electrical Connections to the Awning

NOTICE: Use grommets when routing wiring through the RV wall. If grommets are not used, use heat-shrink tubing where the wiring will pass through the RV wall and make sure sealant will provide effective and permanent protection against wire damage.

This section describes how to complete the motor, hardware, and LED Light connections.

6.4.1 Wiring the Motor Connections

 Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.




18 Connecting the Motor and Hardware Wiring

- 3. Connect the motor wiring to the factory pre-wired hardware wiring.
- 4. Secure any slack motor or hardware wiring inside the front channel to prevent pinched or damaged wiring during awning operation.

6.4.2 Connecting the LED Light Wiring

 Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.

- 2. Connect the LED light connector to the hardware connector.
- 3. Pull the wiring through the wiring hole (and grommet).
- 4. Connect the LED switch wiring to the factory pre-wired LED light strip (RED or WHITE wire positive, BLACK wire negative). See "6.1.3 Installing a LED Light Switch" on page 8.
- 5. Follow the instructions included with the Dometic LED light switch kit to complete the installation.
- 6. Secure the wiring to prevent pinching or other damage during awning operation.
 - Allow enough slack in the wiring to safely allow possible awning fabric movement.

6.5 Completing the Back Channel Installation

A CAUTION: PINCH HAZARD.


Maintain a horizontal distance of at least 16 in. [406 mm] between the fully open awning and any permanent object. Failure to obey this caution could result in injury.

- 1. Connect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.
- 2. Fully retract the awning to verify that the hardware is nesting correctly.
- 3. Open the awning to its full extension.
- 4. Verify the right-hand back channel is still square to the RV and the FRTA. See Figure 14.
- 5. Disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.
- 6. Using either the center mounting holes above or below the strut as a guide, drill 3/16 in. diameter holes into the solid structure of the RV. See Figure 14.
 - Drill 7/32 in. diameter holes if drilling into steel.
 - If the wiring cover is present, it **must** be removed from the right-hand back channel to access the center mounting holes.
- 7. Verify the wiring is not caught between the hardware and the RV wall.
- 8. Apply sealant to the Oscar rivets.
- 9. Insert the Oscar rivets through the back channel (center mounting holes) and secure to the solid structure of the RV. See Figure 16.
 - The structural backing (with skin) **must** be 0.4–0.5 in. [10–13 mm] thick to accommodate the Oscar rivets. Alternatively, structural screws may be used to secure the back channel if the RV has structural backing that will support at least 100 lbf/in² [689 kPa] per screw.
- 10. Replace the wiring cover onto the right-hand back channel, if applicable.
- 11. Repeat steps 4–9 to complete the left-hand back channel installation.
- 12. Connect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.
- 13. Fully retract the awning.

6.6 Installing the Bumper Kit

Awnings longer than 21 ft require the installation of a bumper kit. See "Optional Parts and Kits" on page 4.

- 1. Extend the awning.
- Shut off the gas supply, disconnect the 120 VAC power from the RV, and disconnect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.



20 Connecting the LED Light Wiring


1) Back Channel	③ Bumper

- 3. Screw the bumper into the right-hand back channel approximately 2 in. [5 mm]] below the swing arm.
- 4. Repeat step 3 for the left-hand back channel.
- 5. Connect the positive (+) 12 VDC terminal from the supply battery.
- 6. Fully retract the awning to verify that the hardware is nesting correctly.

6.7 Securing the Awning Fabric to the Awning Rail

- 1. With power applied to the awning, open and close the awning four or five times to allow the natural self adjustment of the awning fabric.
- 2. Verify the alignment of the awning fabric, and the proper nesting of hardware.

- 3. If there is misalignment, adjust the arm assembly:
 - a. Loosen the back channel and top mounting bracket screws.
 - b. Align the back channel.
 - c. Re-tighten the screws.
 - d. Open and close the awning to recheck alignment.

- 4. Verify the arm assemblies are still nested correctly, then mark the location of the awning fabric edges on the awning rail.
- 5. Pull on the opposite edge of awning fabric to stretch it approximately 0.8 in. [20 mm].
- 6. Secure the screw through the awning rail approximately 2 in. [51 mm] from the fabric edge.
- 7. Fully retract the awning.
- 8. Verify that the awning is secure for travel. Refer to the instructions in the operations manual.

7 Disposal
